

Weigh Station Bypass

Weigh station bypass programs are commonly associated with increasing on-route time, delivering freight more quickly, and saving money. All of these benefits help fleets gain a competitive advantage, but a recent survey has shown that bypass programs are also great for recruiting drivers and reducing driver churn. Drivers perceive the value of a company-paid bypass service to be worth more to them than **\$2000 a year**, while saving them more than 7.5 hours of drive time each month. Since the average fleet pays less than \$170 per year to subscribe a driver to Drivewyze, providing company-paid bypass is a cost-effective way to reduce driver churn.

Attract and Retain More Drivers

According to American Trucking Associations², driver turnover is at an estimated 89% for large fleets, and 73% for smaller carriers. The shortage is estimated to be between 35,000-40,000 drivers and it is expected to get worse. The ability to attract and retain drivers gives fleets a competitive advantage.

To attract and keep drivers, companies are providing a wide variety of incentives, such as sign on bonuses and medical benefits. So what else are drivers looking for? According to a recent survey, company-provided weigh station bypass was identified as being a valuable benefit. Bypassing weigh stations allows drivers to obtain on-time performance more frequently - helping them meet Hours of Service requirements and get home faster.

In a recent Drivewyze survey, company-provided weigh station bypass service was ranked as being very valuable to drivers. In fact, it was ranked even higher than non-core benefits such as fuel cards or sign on bonuses.

Furthermore, the survey showed that

74% considered a bypass program extremely valuable when considering a commercial trucking job opportunity.

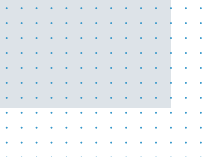
