### Average Age of Autism Diagnosis

| <p>Receiving a diagnosis and beginning special services as early as possible is critical for autistic children. In general, girls present with autism differently than boys, which can make them more difficult to diagnose early.</p> <p>Some states have a higher parent-reported age of diagnosis than others, indicating potential difficulty accessing an early medical diagnosis.</p> |                                   | Missouri | United States |

### Vocational Rehabilitation (VR) Services Outcomes for Autistic Students

| <p>Studies show that receiving VR services during high school leads to better employment outcomes later in life. The implementation and success of VR services may vary between states due to differences in experience delivering transition services or the level of government funding each state receives.</p> |  | Missouri | United States |

| <p>States offer Medicaid waivers that provide access to home and community-based services (HCBS). Many states have waivers for all people with intellectual or developmental disabilities, but some states have special waivers specifically for autism.</p> <p>There are often waitlists for Medicaid waivers. Each state manages waitlists differently—some states don't have eligibility requirements to join a waitlist. Even if your state does not offer a special autism waiver, contact your state's developmental disabilities agency for more information. You may have benefits available to you.</p> <p>State Social Security offices also offer Supplemental Security Income (SSI) and Social Security Disability Insurance (SSDI) benefits.
