AN UNFINISHED WORK

At the March for Jobs in 1963, tens of thousands of people lined the National Mall. They looked towards Abraham Lincoln's Memorial, and they watched Martin Luther King, Jr., deliver his "I Have A Dream" speech from the steps of the monument. Now, all these years later, Martin Luther King, Jr., has his own memorial. It's the newest one on the Mall, and it's the first not dedicated to a president or war hero. The statue itself appears unfinished. It's Martin Luther King, Jr., in a giant slab of white granite, with his feet left uncarved, as if the statue is still a work in progress. The idea is that the fight for civil rights will always be an unfinished project, and we have to keep fighting, keep working, keep pushing.

FREDERICK DOUGLASS NATIONAL HISTORIC SITE

Frederick Douglass was one of the most important figures in the fight against slavery during the 19th century. A former slave himself, he dedicated his life to helping others achieve freedom, and as an adviser to President Lincoln and the U.S. Marshal for the District of Columbia, he began the long process of opening doors for minorities. From 1878 to 1895, Douglass lived at Cedar Hill, and inside the home today you can still see his well-furnished rooms much as they were when he lived here, complete with books, paintings and gifts from Harriet Beecher Stowe and Lincoln himself.
