## **ELLIS ISLAND**

For some 12 million immigrants between 1892 and 1954, Ellis Island was the gateway to a brand new life in the United States. Roughly 40 percent of Americans today are here because an ancestor came through Ellis Island. Today, visitors to the museum get a glimpse into the exciting yet arduous immigrant experience of the 19th and 20th centuries. From the Main Building's baggage room, where immigrants entered just as visitors do today; to the Registry Room upstairs, where they underwent medical and legal processing; to the Wall of Honor commemorating more than 500,000 immigrants and their families; this immersive experience leaves a powerful and lasting impression.





#### THE PEOPLE'S HOUSE

Since it was first built, the White House has always remained open to the people. These days, of course, not just anybody can walk right in the front door, but in centuries past it was quite a different story. President Jackson used to leave a block of cheese out for people to come by and grab a nibble if they were in the neighborhood, and during the Civil War Abraham Lincoln housed Union soldiers on the ground floor.

- Make a photo stop at the Marine Corps War Memorial
- Take part in an evening activity

#### Day 6: Washington, D.C. • Williamsburg

- Explore Washington, D.C. highlights: Photo stops at the White House, Lafayette Square and Black Lives Matter Plaza, Washington Monument, and WWII Memorial
- Enjoy a U.S. Capitol and Visitor Center Tour (subject to availability)
- Make a photo stop at U.S. Supreme Court and the Library of Congress
- Explore the Tidal Basin: FDR Memorial, Martin Luther King, Jr. National Memorial, Jefferson Memorial
- Visit the National Archives
- Travel to Williamsburg

#### Day 7: Williamsburg • Jamestown

- Take a guided sightseeing tour of Colonial Williamsburg: Capitol, Public Gaol, 18th-century tavern
- Continue on to a guided sightseeing tour of Jamestown Settlement: Reproductions of original boats used by early American settlers, 17th-century colonial fort, traditional Powhatan Village
- Enjoy an evening activity

#### Day 8: Washington, D.C. • Return home

- Return to Washington, D.C.
- Enjoy free time in Washington, D.C. (time permitting)
- Depart for home


## MOVING DAY: FROM JAMESTOWN **TO WILLIAMSBURG**


