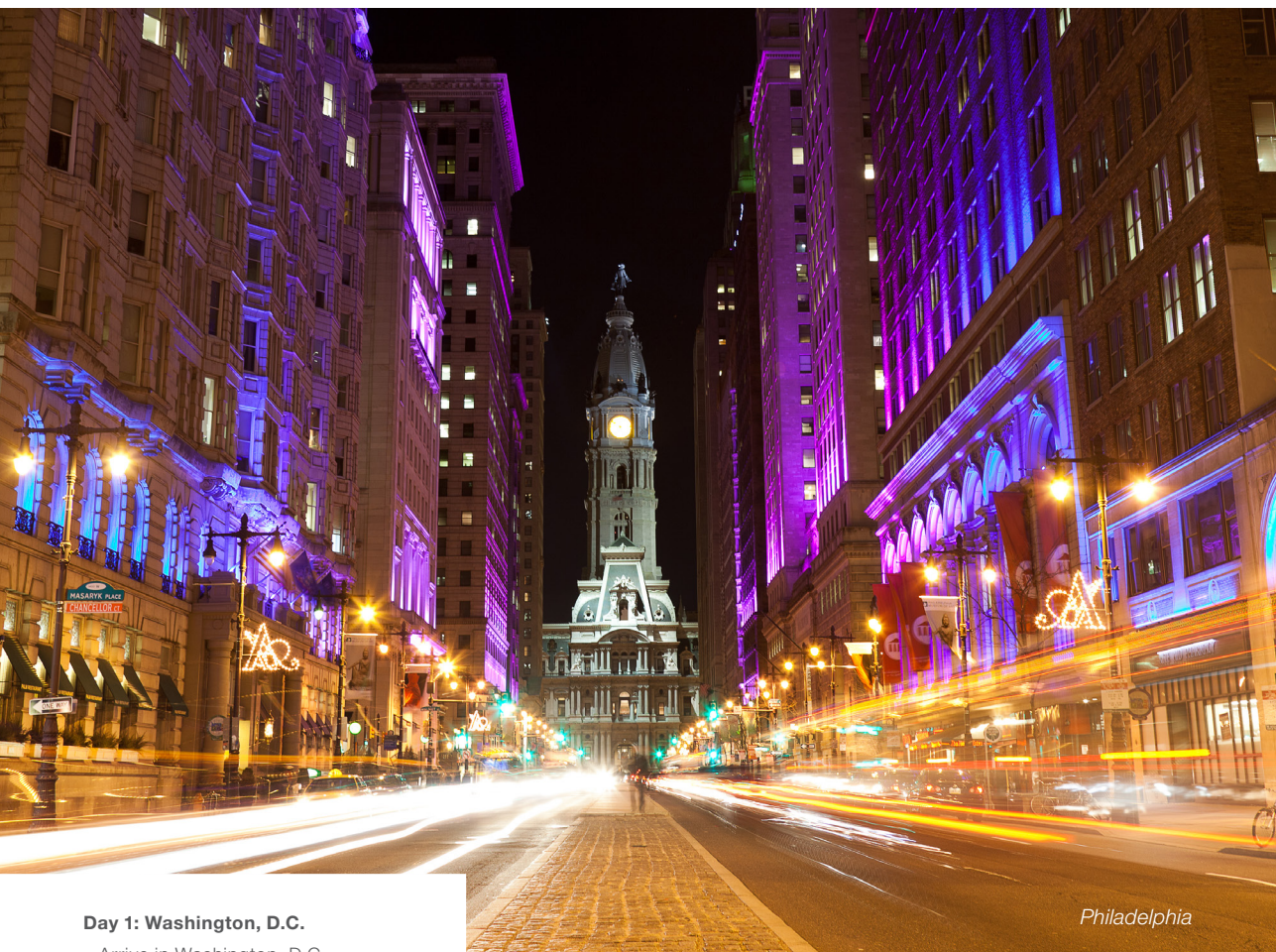

LINCOLN MEMORIAL

The building of the Lincoln Memorial was a big controversy back in the day. Half the country wanted to make a simple log cabin that represented Lincoln's simpler roots, while half the country wanted to build the most impressive monument ever in Washington, D.C., because Lincoln held our country together during its most difficult time. I always ask the kids, "which one would you have wanted? Would you have wanted the log cabin, representing the fact that he was like you and me? Or would you have wanted the temple that exists there today?"

LET FREEDOM RING

Displayed inside a large glass gazebo against the backdrop of Independence Hall, the Liberty Bell is an enduring symbol of American freedom (large crack and all). The bell was cast in England and brought to America in 1752, but the name Liberty Bell wasn't coined until the 1840s by members of the abolitionist movement. It has been a long time since anyone has actually heard the Liberty Bell ring—it was last tolled in 1846 to celebrate George Washington's birthday.

ELLIS ISLAND

Between 1892 and 1954, Ellis Island was the gateway to a brand new life in the United States for about 12 million immigrants. Roughly 40 percent of Americans today are here because an ancestor came through Ellis Island. Today, visitors to the museum can get a glimpse into the immigrant experience of the 19th and 20th centuries. This immersive experience leaves a powerful and lasting impression, covering everything from the Main Building’s baggage room (where immigrants entered just as visitors do today), to the Registry Room upstairs—where immigrants underwent medical and legal processing—to the Wall of Honor that commemorates more than 500,000 immigrants and their families.
