Day 1: New York City

- Arrive in New York City

 United Nations Headquarters; Chrysler
 Building; Grand Central Station; Bryant
 Park; Rockefeller Center; St. Patrick's
 Cathedral; Fifth Avenue
- View the New York City skyline by night from atop one of the city's towering observation decks

- Take a boat tour of New York Harbor and see the Manhattan skyline, Statue of Liberty, and Ellis Island
- Follow the Freedom Trail and explore sites related to the Underground Railroad

LIVE AT THE APOLLO

The Apollo Theater, built in 1914, is known around the world as a legendary venue for some of history's greatest African American entertainers. Iconic performers like Billie Holiday, Duke Ellington, Ella Fitzgerald, and Aretha Franklin launched or boosted their careers on the Apollo stage. Though the theater fell victim to neglect in the 1970s, a 1986 restoration brought it back into the picture, and an additional overhaul in 2009 has the theater looking better than ever. Today, stars continue to grace the stage at the Apollo—from jazz great Wynton Marsalis to the best new hip hop artists. The theater continues to host its famous amateur nights today, where the dreams of everyday performers are put to the test.


- Visit the Schomburg Center for Research in Black Culture

SUGAR HILL

Located in the Hamilton Heights section of Harlem, Sugar Hill was an upscale residential neighborhood whose rowhouses were home to wealthy African Americans during the Harlem Renaissance. The neighborhood got its name because its residents were living the "sweet life," and influential figures like W.E.B. Du Bois, Count Basie, Malcolm X, Ralph Ellison, and Adam C. Powell Sr. all called Sugar Hill home at one point. In the late 1970s, the pioneering rap group Sugarhill Gang, famous for their 1979 hit "Rapper's Delight," named themselves after the historic Harlem neighborhood.
